1. Determine Your Eligibility

- Review Missouri's list of expungable offenses. Certain violent felonies, sex offenses, and DUIs, among others, may not be eligible.
- Confirm that enough time has passed since completing your sentence. Missouri typically requires a waiting period of 3 years for misdemeanors and 7 years for felonies.
- Ensure that you have no pending charges and have maintained a clean record since completing your sentence.

2. Gather Required Documentation

- Obtain certified copies of your criminal record and case disposition. You can request these from the court where your case was processed.
- Collect any necessary forms, such as the <u>Petition for Expungement</u> available through the Missouri courts.
- Gather records showing proof of completion of your sentence (e.g., probation or parole records).
